TO ESTABLISH AN ADMINISTRATOR (BULGARIAN PROPERTY) IN CYPRUS.

WHEREAS by the Treaty of Peace (Bulgaria) Order, 1920, His Majesty in Council made provision for giving effect to certain sections of the Treaty of Peace signed on behalf of His Majesty at Neuilly-sur-Seine on the twenty-seventh day of November, 1919, as set forth in the Schedule to the said Order.

And whereas the said Order was applied to the whole of His Majesty's Dominions, save as therein stated, subject in its application to the parts of His Majesty's Dominions outside the United Kingdom to such modifications as might be made by the legislatures of those parts for adapting to the circumstances thereof the provisions of the said Order.

Now, therefore, be it enacted:—

1. This Law may be cited as the Administrator (Bulgarian Property) Law, 1920. Short title.

2. In this Law:—

“The Peace Order (Bulgaria)” means the Treaty of Peace (Bulgaria) Order, 1920. Interpretation.

3. The Peace Order (Bulgaria) in its application to Cyprus shall be subject to the modifications contained in this Law. Application of Peace Order.

4. The High Commissioner may appoint an Administrator in Cyprus (hereinafter referred to as the Cyprus Administrator), and the Cyprus Administrator shall be assisted by such officers and servants as the High Commissioner may determine, and there shall be paid to the Cyprus Administrator and to such officers and servants such salaries or other remuneration as the High Commissioner may determine. The Cyprus Administrator shall have in Cyprus the same powers as are conferred on the Administrator under the Peace Order (Bulgaria). Administrator.

5. Save so far as the context otherwise requires, the expression “Custodian” in the Peace Order (Bulgaria) means the Custodian of enemy property appointed under the Public Custodian of Enemy Property Proclamation, No. 2, 1916. Custodian.
