BILL Α

AN ACT

To amend the Extradition Act 1903.

B^E it enacted by the King's Most Excellent Majesty, the Senate, and the House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Australia, as follows :----

1.--(1.) This Act may be cited as the Extradition Act 1914.

(2.) The Extradition Act 1903 is in this Act referred to as the .3 **Principal Act.**

(3.) The Principal Act, as amended by this Act, may be cited as the Extradition Act 1903-1914.

2. The Preamble to the Principal Act is amended by omitting 40 from the third paragraph thereof the words "and the Extradition Act 1895", and by inserting in their stead the words "the Extradition Act 1895 and the Extradition Act 1906."

3. The Preamble to the Principal Act and sections three, Amendment of four and five of that Act are amended by omitting the words Preamble, an a. 3, 4 and 5. 15 "Extradition Acts 1870 to 1895", and by inserting in their stead the words "Extradition Acts 1870 to 1906."

4. After section three of the Principal Act the following section is inserted :-

"3A. Where by any Imperial Act passed after the commencement Provision for 20 of this section, any crime, which is not at such commencement further included in the list of crimes in the First Schedule to the extraction orimes. Extradition Aet 1870, is added to that list, this Act shall thereafter be construed as if that crime were an extradition crime within the meaning of this Act."
