A BILL
FOR
AN ACT

To amend the *Extradition Act* 1903.

BE it enacted by the King's Most Excellent Majesty, the Senate,
and the House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of
Australia, as follows :—

- 1.—(1.) This Act may be cited as the *Extradition Act* 1914. Short title
and citation.
- 5 (2.) The *Extradition Act* 1903 is in this Act referred to as the
Principal Act.
- (3.) The Principal Act, as amended by this Act, may be cited as
the *Extradition Act* 1903-1914.
2. The Preamble to the Principal Act is amended by omitting
10 from the third paragraph thereof the words "and the *Extradition*
Act 1895", and by inserting in their stead the words "the
Extradition Act 1895 and the *Extradition Act* 1906."
3. The Preamble to the Principal Act and sections three,
four and five of that Act are amended by omitting the words
15 "Extradition Acts 1870 to 1895", and by inserting in their stead
the words "Extradition Acts 1870 to 1906." Amendment of
Preamble, and
ss. 3, 4 and 5.
4. After section three of the Principal Act the following section
is inserted :—
- 20 "3A. Where by any Imperial Act passed after the commencement
of this section, any crime, which is not at such commencement
included in the list of crimes in the First Schedule to the
Extradition Act 1870, is added to that list, this Act shall thereafter
be construed as if that crime were an extradition crime within the
meaning of this Act." Provision for
