- Share good practices and lessons from the countries of the Asia-Pacific region that can be easily adopted and adapted according to specific needs of the countries
- Provide practical guidance and approaches about tools and processes that can be applied for mainstreaming DRR in existing programmes, activities and projects
- Strengthen regional and south-south cooperation by sharing knowledge and experiences, and bridging gaps in policy and planning for mainstreaming DRR in sustainable development planning

ATTENDANCE

- Ministries of planning, finance, and disaster management from the following member States in Asia-Pacific: Afghanistan, Bhutan, Cambodia, Fiji, India, Maldives, Myanmar, Nepal, Samoa and Sri Lanka.

PROCEEDINGS

- Introduction of **Regional Guidebook for Mainstreaming Disaster Risk Reduction in Sustainable Development** as a customizable approach for mainstreaming DRR into national, sub-national, and sectoral development planning
- Introduction of **guidelines for a risk-sensitive approach** for mainstreaming DRR at the **subnational level**
- Presentation of **Sector-specific guidelines** by UNDP, UNICEF, NIDM and ESCAP; with a **specific focus on integration of CCA and DRR**
- Introduction of **new analytical tools and techniques** to support evidencebased mainstreaming in development planning; including *ex-ante* risk assessments and *ex-post* damage and loss assessment methodologies

DISCUSSIONS & KEY OUTCOMES

- Substantive feedback and input from participants on components of the Regional Guidebook
- Need for improved data collection, documentation, and enhanced technical capacity of Governments and line Ministries to understand and use risk assessments in planning decisions
- Requirement expressed for sustained and dedicated resources in DRR-related national and sub-national priorities, and enhanced awareness and capacity across Ministries at all levels of governance for mainstreaming DRR into development planning.
- Need for **enhanced regional exchanges** in planning approaches and frameworks, due to the increasingly **transboundary** nature of disasters and growing **multi-hazard exposure** in

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
