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13h00 – 16h30	Session 2: Bridging the national-subnational-local gaps in urban nexus practice
	Local governments are responsible for a growing number of issues, including integrated resource management at the local level. However, gaps exist between responsibilities and actual mandates, financing sources and capacities of local governments to implement urban nexus initiatives. Moreover, almost all cities have outgrown their original municipal jurisdiction and their urban areas now extend into at least one other neighboring local government (and often many). Therefore, managing the resource footprint of cities across various ecosystems calls for institutional coordination and other forms of collaboration - which has rarely been evident.  This session discussed these challenges with a view to developing recommendations for the establishment of the enabling environment required for urban nexus
	initiatives to thrive.
	Part A: "Financing the urban nexus" (Moderated by GIZ)
	This session explored existing opportunities for financing nexus initiatives and aimed to develop recommendation for the enabling framework required to channel public and private finance into urban nexus initiatives.
13h00 – 14h30	Panelists were invited to reflect on the relevance of the nexus approach and opportunities for financing and/or leveraging ongoing initiatives within their respective mandates/programmes. Panelists reflected on the specific challenges and opportunities related to the projects in Chiang Mai and Nakhon Ratchasima presented in Session 1.
