1. Greater Tumen Initiative (GTI) Member Countries and Regions

The Greater Tumen Initiative (GTI), originally known as the Tumen River Area Development Programme, is a unique intergovernmental economic cooperation mechanism in NEA, supported by the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), with four members: China, Mongolia, ROK and Russia.

1. Greater Tumen Initiative (GTI) Brief History and Feature

Evolution of the GTI Framework

- 1991, Tumen River Area Development Programme (TRADP) initiated by UNDP
- 1995, the member countries signed a formal agreement on the establishment of the intergovernmental mechanism
- 2005, the member countries agreed to extend the 1995 Agreement for another ten years and assume the full ownership

A multilateral intergovernmental platform

- Since its creation, GTI has been serving as an active catalyst for expanding policy dialogue among its members and strengthening fundaments for economic growth in the region
- Member-country driven partnership while remain supported by UNDP

- In specific terms, the member countries aim to create a growth pole for development in the NEA region, and make the Greater Tumen Region (GTR) an attractive one for trade and investment

- Attain sustainable development and common prosperity





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GTI Consultative Commission (CC)

- The decision-making institution of GTI (Vice-Minister level)
- Composed of high level officials from member governments
- Annual meeting provides a venue for intergovernmental exchanges

GTI Tumen Secretariat

- Executing body of the Consultative Commission
- Coordinating GTI activities and implementing CC decisions
- Operation under the administrative support by the UNDP

National Coordinators

National focal points for GTI

Sectoral Board/Committee

- Specific cooperation activities and project promotion in key sectors
- Composed of senior officials from relevant ministries
