Which data are essential for understanding a country's labor market dynamics and designing effective policies to support the creation of decent jobs? What are the main challenges in evaluating the impact of policies to improve material conditions?

	At the just-concluded Rio+20 Conference on Sustainable Development, the Heads of State and Government and high-level representatives recognized the need for broader measures of progress to complement GDP in order to better inform policy decisions. This session will focus on the progress that subregional countries have made in improving the quality of life of its populations, and how it is measured. The panelists will address issues such as social cohesion, health and education focusing on few questions such as: • What are the instruments being currently used to evaluate the quality of life? • What is the status of implementation of Civil Registration and Vital Statistics (CRVS) systems, an essential step to fulfill governments' commitment to maternal, newborn and child health? • How are education outcomes and skills measured in sub-regional countries, aiming at achieving educational systems that are easily accessible and responsive to the needs of the labour market? • What are the data requirements and measures to assess the level of social cohesion within a country? Of interest are measures that capture social inclusion, trust and the sense of belonging and social mobility. • How can governments use new data to put in place more effective policies? • How can the various data producers and consumers make joint efforts to build the required capacities within countries? 	The Rio+20 Conference outlined the challenges facing the world and how to cope with them, including the need to develop Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). Some of the key questions to be addressed by panelists include:
	 Drawing from the Rio+20 outcome, what are the main challenges before the sub-regional societies?
	 What are the challenges and the opportunities of current development trends?
	• How can statistical offices contribute to better prepare governments and societies to the challenges of sustainable development (including food security and the vulnerability of sub-regional countries to climate change - flooding, costal erosion, droughts, etc.)?
	 Which challenges exist for regular data collection and the development of indicators that will enable governments to better forecast future developments?
	 How are governments/societies handling those challenges? What should be done in the formulation of SDGs so that this exercise benefits from the experiences gained in formulating and implementing MDGs?
