# UNFPA Indonesia COVID-19 Response Situational Report





### SYAHRUNI: A REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH HERO IN DISASTER RESPONSE

At least 38 people were killed, 10 disappeared, and around 15,000 (4,897 households) are sheltering in internally displaced people (IDP) camps in 11 spots (as of 19 August 2020, BNPB) after floods and landslides struck six districts in North Luwu, South Sulawesi, on 13 July. Syahruni, the Public Health Coordinator of the North Luwu Health Office, took on the task of coordinating the District Reproductive Health sub-cluster. Her first experience working in disaster response, Syahruni ensures the needs of women and newborn babies sheltering in IDP camps are met. Despite additional challenges in facing risks of Coronavirus infection among survivors and aid workers, Syahruni and team stay committed. "We are always motivated to serve the people," she says. ## HIGHLIGHTS

- As of 31 August 2020, the Government of Indonesia announced 174,796 confirmed cases of COVID-19, 7,417 deaths, and 125,959 recovered cases.
- UNFPA has initiated distributing dignity kits and reproductive health tent to save the lives of women and girls affected by the recent flooding and landslides in North Luwu, with support from Australia's Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade (DFAT).
- UNFPA supported the National Population and Family Planning Board (BKKBN) with the development and sensitization of the Operational Guidelines on

#### INDONESIA ONE DISASTER DATA ENSURES BETTER COORDINATION DURING **HUMANITARIAN CRISES**

The availability of accurate and easy-to-use baseline disaster statistics data and information is very important for disaster preparedness and response. In the event of a disaster, data and information can assist decision-makers in formulating the best steps to take, and allow for more precise analyses in determining total populations affected, vulnerable groups, and public

infrastructure exposed to hazards in a region. The National Disaster Management Agency (BNPB) and BPS-Statistics Indonesia, with technical guidance of UNFPA Indonesia, developed Indonesia One Disaster Data. An integral part of Indonesia One-Data coordination mechanism, this national disaster-related statistics framework ensures data credibility, consistency, interoperability, and international comparability.

#### COMMUNITY OF PRACTICE: A SUPPORT SYSTEM FOR YOUNG CONTENT CREATORS 20 AUGUST 2020



UNFPA Indonesia started a Community of Practice (CoP) for young digital Sexual and Reproductive Health (SRH) content creators in June 2020. The CoP is a network of youth influencers and youthled digital platforms that produce youth SRH-related content. The CoP serves as a knowledge management platform to share best practices, tools, research,

and other resources among creators and practitioners. It currently consists of 22 members, ranging from individual influencers, civil society organizations (CSOs), media companies, private enterprises, and international non-governmental organizations (NGOs). Representing different regions of Indonesia—from Java to Papua—-the members have a combined audience of over 200,000 young people.

## **RESULTS RECAP**

- Four hundred and twelve (412) PPEs provided to midwives in Depok, Tangerang, and South Jakarta (April-August).
- Over 60,000 female sex workers reached through online activities and social media, and provided with information on HIV prevention and treatment.
- Provided SRH services to at least **5,352 young people** through youth health lines facilitated by UNALA clinics in Yogyakarta.
- A thousand and three hundred and three (1,303) health practitioners and government officers trained on how to ensure availability of contraceptives during crisis situations.
- Eight (8) protection and referral mechanisms established or strengthened to support gender-based violence (GBV) survivors.

## **PROGRAMME HIGHLIGHTS**

### SEXUAL REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH

- Supported Ministry of Health in finalizing and disseminating the **Technical Guideline on Contraceptive Availability in Crisis Situations** including during the COVID-19 pandemic.
- Continues to provide technical support and capacity building to Indonesian Midwives Association (IBI) to strengthen **family planning and SRH services** during pandemic.
- Conducting analysis on the impact of COVID-19 pandemic on SRH services.
- Distributing **990 dignity kits and one reproductive health tent** to save the lives of women and girls affected by the recent flooding and landslides in North Luwu, South Sulawesi with support from DFAT.

### **GENDER-BASED VIOLENCE (GBV)**

• Provided technical assistance in the development and dissemination of government protocols on **GBV prevention**, management, and essential services.
