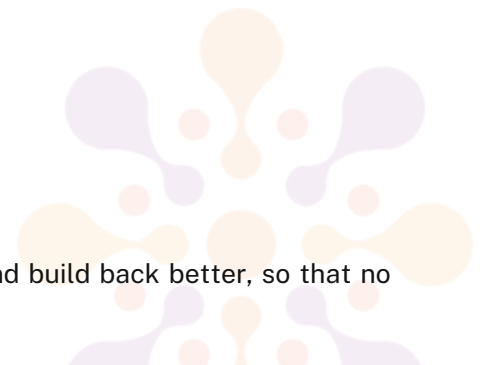
Universal Access to Reproductive Health: Our Goal in 2021-2025

Ensuring universal access to sexual and reproductive health information and services, especially for women and girls, is the goal of the 10th Country Programme 2021-2025 between the Government of Indonesia and UNFPA.

To achieve the three transformative results and SDGs by 2030, the partnership between UNFPA and the Government of Indonesia focuses on:

- Strengthening midwifery workforce
- Engaging youth for meaningful participation
- Preventing HIV among key populations
- Ending female genital mutilation (FGM) and child marriage
- Improving humanitarian-development nexus
- Maximising use of data for policy and programme
