

## Context and Objective

This report depicts information about people registered by UNHCR, the UN Refugee Agency, in Brazil. The data used for the report is extracted from UNHCR's registration system, proGres – part of [Population Registration and Identity Management EcoSystem \(PRIMES\)](#) tools.

Registration is a key activity of UNHCR in Brazil. The process entails recording, verifying and updating information of persons of concern with the objective of strengthening the protection and solutions response through a better understanding of population profile and needs.

Even though information is updated periodically for some people, this report does not present an exact, real-time profile of the current population in the country. While providing a glimpse on the profile of people registered, this report does not substitute official government sources on population data in Brazil.

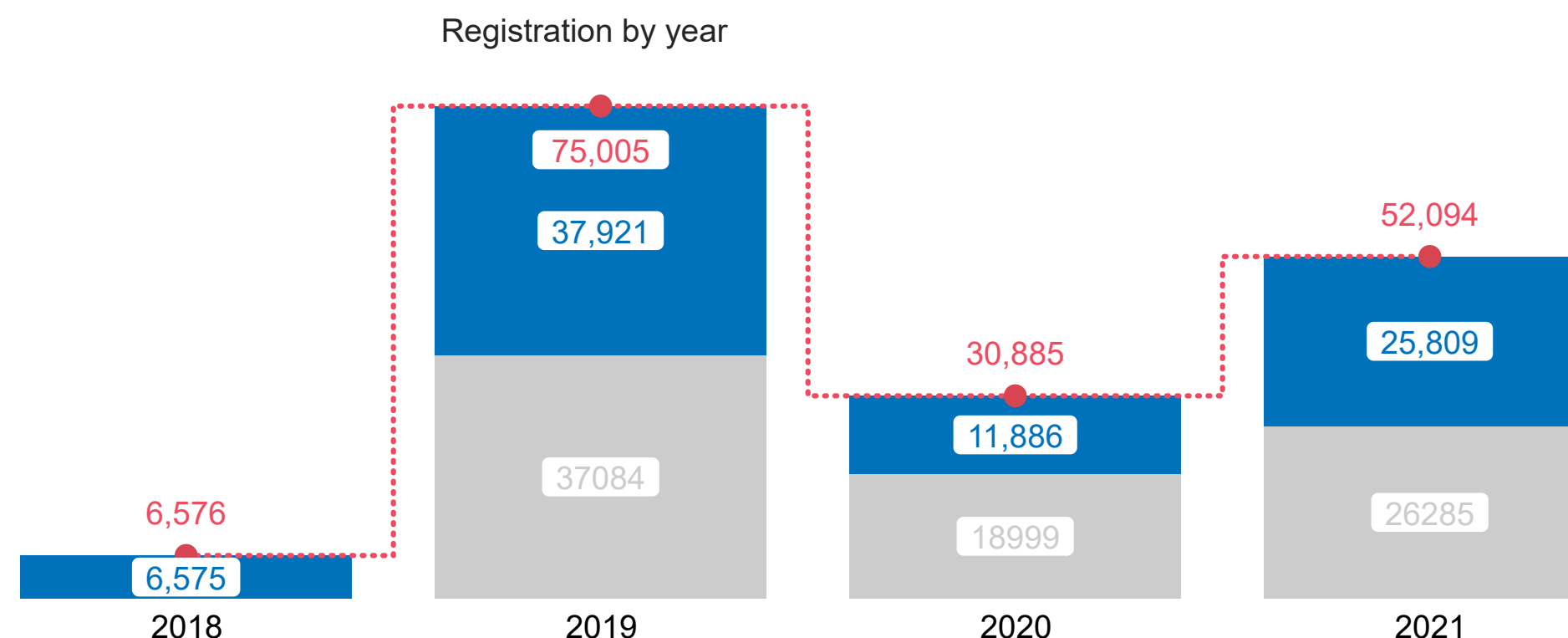

## Registration modalities

UNHCR and partners register all individuals supported with documentation at the Reception, Documentation and Relocation centres (PTRIGs). UNHCR and partners also register all individuals who require other types of case management, such as protection, humanitarian assistance and interiorization. Registration is done both inside and outside the PTRIGs. This dashboard is divided into: individual registration and reception registration. In fact, in Brazil, these are the two registration modalities used in the country:

- group/reception: people active
- individual: people active
- grand Total




**Group/Reception:** In order to facilitate and speed up the registration process at PTRIG, individuals that are supported with documentation and without any other protection need are registered in the database with the so-called Reception Modality. This is a faster type of registration with the breakdown by sex and age of the members of a group and only more detailed data about the group's Focal Point, such as addresses, documents available and specific needs.

**Individual:** this modality is used to facilitate case management inside the database. It entails a more detailed and comprehensive registration, with data collected for every member of the group, including biometric data.

There exist also some instances in which individuals have been previously registered under the reception modality, but later should be registered under the individual modality to facilitate case management in the system. In this instance, the reception is converted into individual registration. Therefore, in the number presented in the dashboard, if a family was registered under reception and later converted into individual registration, it will only be counted in the individual registration.

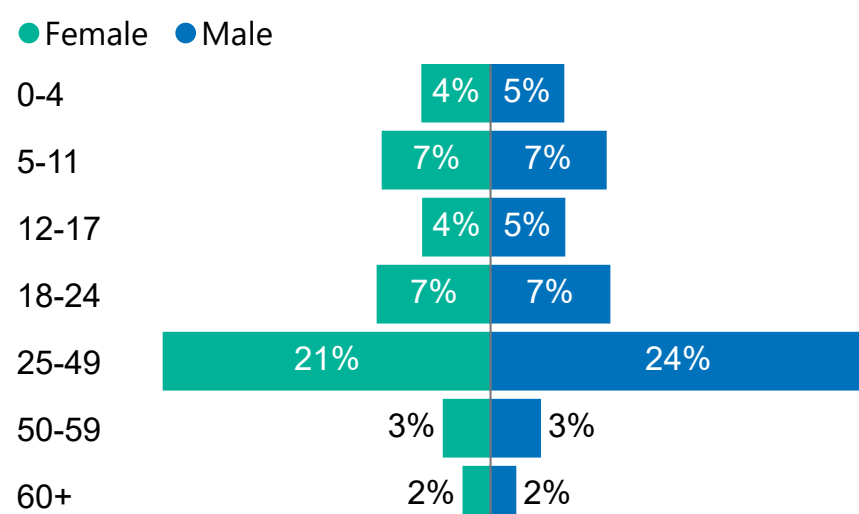

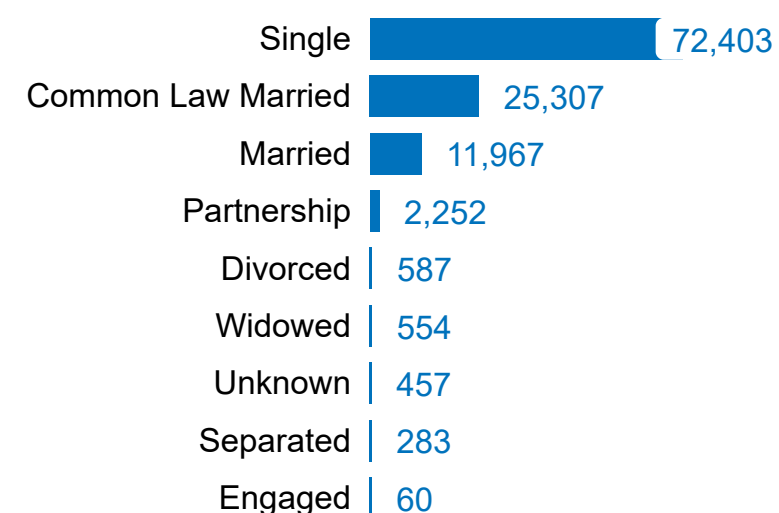

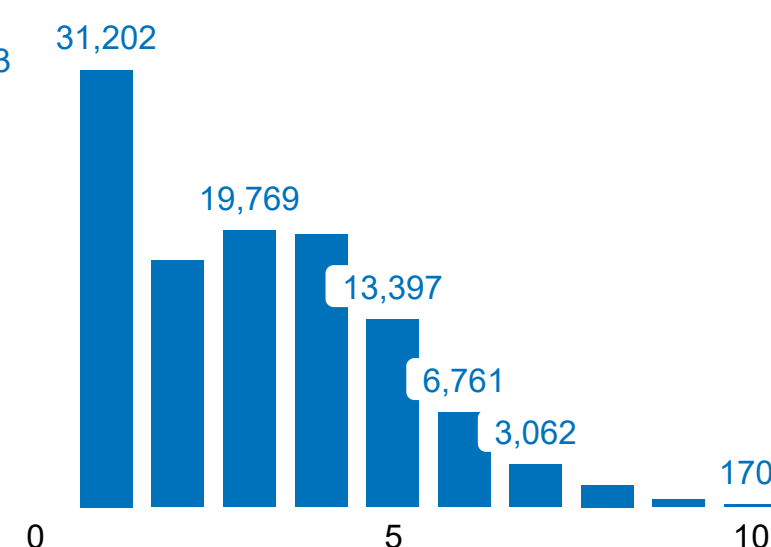
Registered people by age cohorts and sex



Registered people by marital status\*



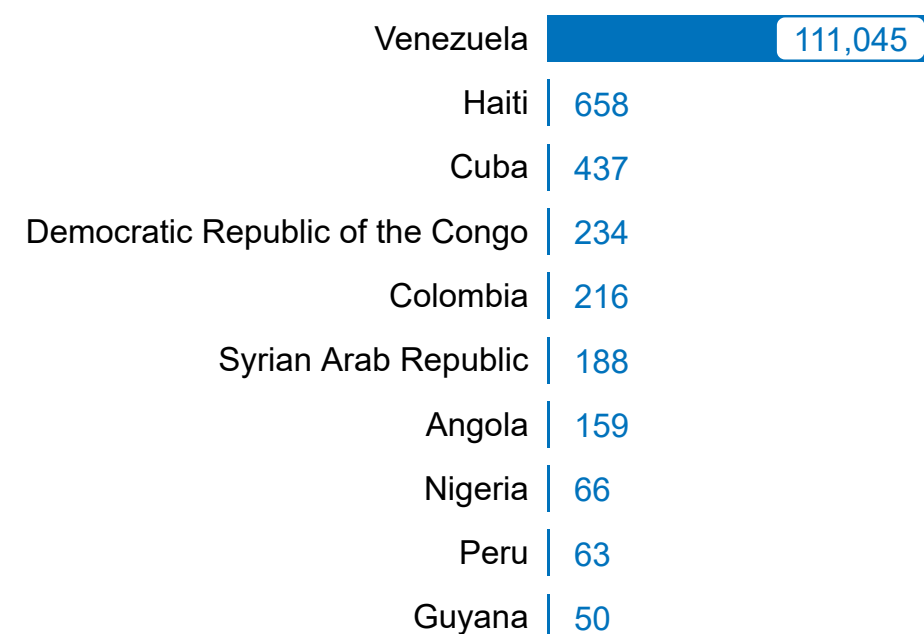
Registered people by group size\*



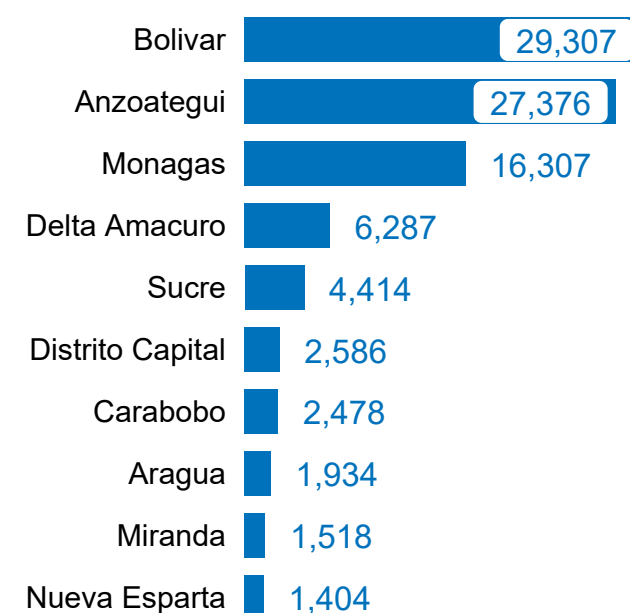
Most recent location of registered people

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UNHCR recognizes that some individuals or groups of people in situations of forced displacement have specific protection needs (SPN) as they face greater risks due to their individual characteristics or to wider factors in the protection environment. These people face specific barriers depending on age, gender and diversity criteria, as well as other factors that prevent them from fully enjoying their rights and make them more susceptible to exploitation, abuse and other violations. Timely identification of individuals with specific needs is crucial in order to best support them.

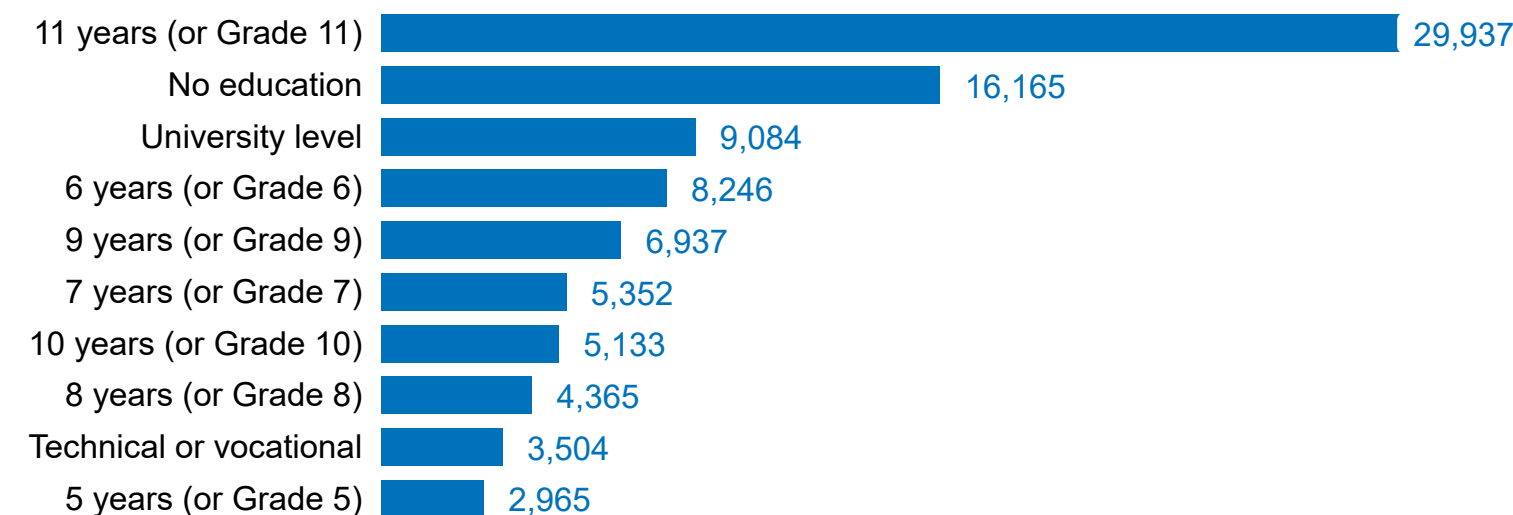
It is important that the identification of persons with specific needs is a continuous process. Among the main categories of specific needs identified in Brazil legal and physical protection needs include persons with legal protection needs because of a threat to life, freedom or physical safety. Children at risk include for example children at risk of not attending school, unaccompanied or separated children are persons below the age of 18 who are currently not under the care of either parent or other legal or customary primary caregiver. Women might be at risk because of their gender, such as single mothers or caregivers, single women, widows, older women with disabilities and survivors of violence.
