FOREWORD

Immunization is among the most successful and cost-effective health interventions in history. Vaccines have saved countless lives. In the Western Pacific Region, immunization has stopped transmission of wild poliovirus and dramatically reduced transmission of measles and hepatitis B.

We know vaccines work. Now we need to overcome the obstacles to delivering vaccines to all people. The Decade of Vaccines Collaboration has brought stakeholders together. In 2012, the World Health Assembly endorsed the *Global Vaccine Action Plan 2011–2020*. The plan details strategies and activities to achieve the Decade of Vaccines vision. Their shared mission is to extend – by 2020 and beyond – the full benefits of immunization to all people, regardless of where they are born, who they are or where they live.

This *Regional Framework for Implementation of the Global Vaccine Action Plan in the Western Pacific* guides national immunization programmes to fulfil this mission. The sixty-fifth session of the Regional Committee for the Western Pacific and the Technical Advisory Group on Immunization and Vaccine-preventable Diseases have endorsed the framework.

The regional framework confirms regional immunization goals of sustaining polio-free status, eliminating measles and maternal and neonatal tetanus, and controlling hepatitis B through vaccination.

Countries of the Region have proposed four additional goals: elimination of rubella;
