CONVENTION¹ ON POSTAL, TELEGRAPH AND TELEPHONE RELATIONS BETWEEN FRANCE AND THE PRINCIPALITY OF MONACO

The Government of the French Republic and His Serene Highness the Prince of Monaco have decided to conclude a Convention on Postal, Telegraph and Telephone Relations, and to that end have agreed on the following provisions:

SECTION I. POSTAL AND TELEGRAPH SERVICES

Article 1

Postal and telegraph services in the Principality of Monaco shall be provided through the French Postal and Telecommunications Administration.

Article 2

All laws, regulations and tariffs applicable to the French postal and telegraph service shall apply in Monegasque territory.

Any new legal or regulatory provisions in this field which are adopted in France shall likewise be applicable.

Article 3

Postal articles originating in the Principality shall be prepaid by means of distinguishing postage stamps of that territory.

Article 4

The French Postal and Telecommunications Administration may, with the agreement of the Government of the Principality, return to origin or charge postage at its internal rates on items addressed to France which senders resident in French territory cause to be posted in the Principality of Monaco.

Article 5

Prior to their appointment in the Principality by the French Administration, personnel responsible for the operation of postal and telegraph services shall be approved by the Government of the Principality, which reserves the right to request their replacement.

The Government of the Principality agrees to provide employees of the French Postal and Telecommunications Administration in its territory with all necessary guarantees for the performance of their duties.

Article 6

The personnel mentioned above in the first paragraph of article 5 shall be considered joint personnel.

As such, and through the postmaster under whose authority they are placed in the Principality:

- They shall liaise with the French Administration, represented by the Director of Posts and Telecommunications of the Alpes-Maritimes, and shall take orders from him with regard to general service matters;
- They shall also abide by the instructions of the Monegasque authorities with regard to internal service in the Principality.

Article 7

Further to the operation of postal and telegraph services in the Principality, an annual account shall be prepared by the French Administration and submitted for the approval of the Government of the Principality.

The total revenue from postal and telegraph receipts in the Principality's post offices shall be credited to this account, minus the share of telegraph and postal transit charges payable to foreign offices; the technical installation and operating costs of these offices (staff salaries and allowances, rent, miscellaneous supplies, etc.), including any indemnity payable to third parties, shall be debited to the account.

The account shall be balanced at the end of each financial year. In the event of a shortfall in revenue, the Government of the Principality shall make good the deficit, and in the event of a surplus of revenue over expenditure, the surplus shall be shared between the two Governments in the proportion of 93 per cent for the Principality to 7 per cent for France.

During the financial year, quarterly payments on account may be made at the end of the quarter at the request of the Government of the Principality. The amount of these payments on account shall be calculated on the basis of the revenue for the quarter in question, minus approximate expenditure determined as follows: one quarter of the expenditure for the most recent financial year completed, multiplied by the ratio of the value of the gold franc at the end of the quarter in question to the value of the gold franc at the end of the corresponding quarter of that financial year.

Article 8

The French Government shall be exempted from postal charges at the post offices of the Principality in respect of its representatives, whether officials or employees, who enjoy the same exemption in French territory.

His Serene Highness the Prince of Monaco shall be exempted from postal charges both in France and Monaco in respect of any correspondence he may send as well as any correspondence he may receive from any other person.

The Minister of State of the Principality shall enjoy the same exemptions as His Serene Highness the Prince.

The French Government shall enjoy the same exemption from telegraph charges at Monegasque offices as it enjoys in its own territory.

His Serene Highness the Prince and the Minister of State of the Principality shall be exempted from charges in respect of their telegraph communications from Monegasque offices to any French office and vice versa.

The Prince's Representative to the French Government shall enjoy exemption from postal and telegraph charges in respect of his correspondence with the Prince and the Minister of State.

Article 9

The Government of the Principality shall retain ownership of the technical installations, equipment and telegraph lines installed in its territory by the French Government for the Principality's postal and telegraph service.

The French Government shall retain ownership of telegraph lines which it has installed across Monegasque territory; no transit charge shall therefore be paid in respect of such lines.

SECTION II. TELEPHONE SERVICE

Article 10

Telephone service in the Principality shall be provided by the Monegasque Administration; however, the French Government shall cooperate in establishing and developing telephone communications through French lines between the Principality and all other countries.

Article 11

The charges applicable in the Principality to long-distance calls to France shall be the same as those collected in France for similar calls. The charges applicable in the Principality to calls to foreign countries shall be the same as those collected in the department of Alpes-Maritimes for similar calls.

Article 12

For all telephone communications between the Principality on the one hand, and France and foreign countries on the other, the Principality shall be allotted, per three-minute unit of conversation, a standard proportion of seven tenths of the basic charge applied in France.

Procedures for determining the traffic to be taken into consideration in preparing the apportionment account shall be established by agreement between the Monegasque Telephone Office and the French Postal and Telecommunications Administration.

The proportion referred to above may if necessary be adjusted by means of a direct exchange of views between the Parties concerned, particularly:

- In the event of amendment of the schedule of long-distance charges, which currently range from a factor of two (twice the basic charge) to a factor of 16 (16 times the basic charge);
- In the event of the generalized use of pulse charging.
