EXTENSION OF THE TEMPORARY EMERGENCY DELIVERY OF COLORADO RIVER WATER FOR USE IN TIJUANA, BAJA CALIFORNIA

The Commission met at the offices of the Mexican Section in Ciudad Juarez, Chihuahua on November 14, 2008 at 10:00 am, to consider the request by the Baja California State Water Commission (CEA) to extend for an additional five-years the delivery to Tijuana, Baja California, through the Otay International Connection, of a portion of the Colorado River waters allotted to Mexico under the "United States-Mexico Treaty for Utilization of Waters of the Colorado and Tijuana Rivers and of the Rio Grande," signed February 3, 1944 (hereinafter the 1944 Water Treaty), based on the principles established in International Boundary and Water Commission Minute No. 240, entitled, "Emergency Deliveries of Colorado River Waters for Use in Tijuana" dated June 13, 1972, as subsequently amended and extended, and most recently in Commission Minute No. 310, entitled, "Emergency Delivery of Colorado River Water for Use in Tijuana, Baja California" dated July 28, 2003, which is scheduled to expire in November 2008.

The Commissioners considered the information provided by the CEA and by the State Public Utility Commission of Tijuana (CESPT) that in light of a potential contingency that could affect the region's water supply and due to involuntary delays in the execution of the "Expansion of the Colorado River-Tijuana Aqueduct," they foresee partial water supply shortage periods in the next five years, until said infrastructure improvements are able to cover the growing needs over the short and medium term. The Commissioners observed that the connection constructed to enable emergency water deliveries to Mexico at the international land boundary at Otay Mesa-Mesa de Otay, under Minute No. 240, as subsequently amended and extended, was rehabilitated at a cost to Mexico for the emergency deliveries to resume and continue, also at a cost to Mexico. The Commissioners noted that CESPT has fulfilled the commitment stipulated in the "Joint Report of the Principal Engineers to Facilitate Emergency Delivery of Colorado River Water for Use in Tijuana, Baja California," dated July 11, 2003, which forms part of Commission Minute No. 310, to reimburse funds spent by the Otay Water District (OWD) on the installation of equipment necessary for the deliveries and not recovered by deliveries made during the five year period covered under Minute No. 310 through rates charged per cubic meter of water delivered on site and sent to the City of Tijuana through October 2008.

The U.S. Commissioner informed that the United States Bureau of Reclamation (Bureau), and the California agencies: San Diego County Water Authority (SDCWA), the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California (MWD), and the Otay Water District, which own and operate the conveyance system from Parker Dam on the Colorado River to the Otay Water District, are able and willing, in principle, to make the

emergency water deliveries to Tijuana, B.C. in the volumes and periods as estimated by the CESPT, to avoid the water supply shortages for the next five years starting November 11, 2008 through November 9, 2013.

The Commissioners reviewed the 2003 "Joint Report of the Principal Engineers to Facilitate Emergency Delivery of Colorado River Water for Use in Tijuana, Baja California," which forms part of Commission Minute No. 310, and they concur that the terms and conditions of the 2003 Joint Report will remain in full force and effect, as specified in the attached and amended Joint Report which forms an integral part of this Minute. Additionally, Table 1 entitled "Charges to Mexico for Emergency Deliveries for Tijuana of a Portion of Mexico's 1944 Colorado River Treaty Water," which forms an integral part of the amended Joint Report, has been revised to reflect the current cost of deliveries.

Based on the foregoing, the Commissioners adopted the following resolutions, subject to the approval of the two Governments:

- That Commission Minute No. 310 shall be extended for an additional year, to allow for the delivery at the international land boundary to Tijuana, Baja California, of a portion of Colorado River waters allotted to Mexico in the 1944 Water Treaty, between November 11, 2008 and November 10, 2009, in a manner that does not affect the delivery or discharge of water to the United States customers.
- 2 That Commission Minute No. 310 may be extended for subsequent one year periods for a total not to exceed five years, to allow delivery at the international land boundary to Tijuana, Baja California, of a portion of Colorado River waters allotted to Mexico in the 1944 Water Treaty until November 9, 2013, subject to an annual exchange of diplomatic notes between the two governments. The annual deliveries shall be made in accordance with procedures adopted annually by the Commission.
- 3. That the Government of Mexico shall assure that payment is made by CESPT, in advance of each delivery, of any and all financial costs incurred in making the water deliveries at a cost to Mexico that is equivalent to that charged to United States customers in that area.
- 4. That the water deliveries shall be made in accordance with the provisions in the "Amended Joint Report of the Principal Engineers to Facilitate Emergency Delivery of Colorado River Water for Use in Tijuana, Baja California," signed by U.S. Section Principal Engineer Alfredo J. Riera and Mexican Section Principal Engineer Luis Antonio Rascon Mendoza, October 24, 2008, a copy of which is attached and forms an integral part of this Minute.
- That all activities undertaken pursuant to this Minute shall be subject to the availability of funds, resources, and corresponding personnel, as well as to applicable laws and regulations in each country.

6. That this Minute shall enter into force upon notification of approval by the Government of the United States of America and the Government of the United Mexican States through the respective Sections of the Compaission.

AMENDED JOINT REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL ENGINEERS TO FACILITATE EMERGENCY DELIVERY OF COLORADO RIVER WATER FOR USE IN TIJUANA, BAJA CALIFORNIA

To the Honorable Commissioners International Boundary and Water Commission United States and Mexico El Paso, Texas and Ciudad Juarez, Chihuahua

Sirs:

Pursuant to your instructions, we respectfully submit this Joint Report in furtherance of the interest expressed by water authorities in San Diego, California and Tijuana, Baja California in effecting emergency deliveries, through the aqueduct system in southern California, of a portion of the waters of the Colorado River allotted to Mexico by Article 10(a) of the "United States -Mexico Treaty for Utilization of Waters of the Colorado and Tijuana Rivers and of the Rio Grande," signed February 3, 1944 (1944 Water Treaty). Low water reserves resulting from drought conditions over the Tijuana River watershed and continued growth of the Tijuana, B.C. metropolitan area have resulted in a projected shortage of water to supply the needs of the city in the near future. Unless these emergency water deliveries are made, the municipalities of Tijuana and Rosarito, B.C., which currently have a population of about 1,300,000 inhabitants, will suffer serious shortages of water. Mexican water authorities are developing plans to provide for future water supply; however, construction of needed infrastructure will be costly and will take several years to implement. Part of this planning includes execution of a binational feasibility study with the San Diego County Water Authority (SDCWA) authorized under Minute No. 301 of the International Boundary and Water Commission, United States and Mexico (IBWC), concerning a potential binational aqueduct to increase the water supply to the San Diego-Tijuana region.

We note that three California agencies have previously cooperated in providing emergency delivery of Colorado River waters to Tijuana prior to the construction of Mexico's Colorado River Aqueduct in Baja California during the 1970's. The deliveries were made through the facilities of the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California (MWD), SDCWA, and Otay Water District (OWD) through an extension of the OWD water transmission system, constructed at a cost to Mexico for the delivery of water to Tijuana at the international boundary at Otay Mesa. These California agencies have expressed a willingness to do so again, subject to the availability of capacity in their systems, and reimbursement of all costs for conveyance of the water deliveries and construction of improvements to the OWD connection system along with other aspects of environmental protection.

We observe the information of the California agencies in the sense that the cost for the deliveries would be equivalent to the costs for similar deliveries to United States users in the area. An
